

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The City Charter Should Not Be Changed for One Person's Benefit

The city appointed Charter Review Commission has acted irresponsibly for the past few years – or ever since Mayor Kapszukiewicz was elected. They's supposed to act on behalf of Toledo's citizens. Instead, they do what the mayor wishes them to do – which is help his political career.

A little Toledo history. When Councilman Jack Ford, Lucas County Treasurer Larry Kaczala and I (as a city councilman) proposed to consider putting Strong Mayor-directly elected District Councilmen form of government to a vote of the citizens in 1992, we first traveled, with 40 Toledo business and labor leaders, to Minneapolis, Pittsburgh, Louisville and Cleveland to study their respective forms of municipal government.

After returning to Toledo, we met as a team, and urged, via a 100-person committee, that Toledo citizens vote in the affirmative for the Strong Mayor and a City Council split 50/50 between at-Large and District Councilpersons. Because of our study of the other cities we visited, we recommended that mayoral service be limited to two consecutive four-year terms.

The nearly 18-hour days required of a mayor tend to burnout mayors, as well as presidents and governors, almost all of whom are limited to eight consecutive years in office. Councilmembers' time demands are not as great, therefore three consecutive terms of four years was the recommendation of our committee.

Mayor Kapszukiewicz and his friends on the Charter Commission have been trying to sneak through a change in the City Charter to enable the mayor to serve a third consecutive term, rather than the terms called for in the 1992 Charter change. Could it be the mayor wishes to serve a third consecutive term on the public payroll so that his already generous retirement income will be enhanced significantly?

Just a bit more of Toledo History. When, in 2001, after having had seven productive years as mayor, I respected the two-term limit on my job and stepped down, we had just successfully secured a future for Jeep's new north Toledo plant. We had also been recently named one of the ten All-American cities in this country. But it was clear in our City Charter that a mayor be limited to two consecutive four-year terms. I sat out for four



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years, before being voted back in a mayor in 2005.

Our present mayor should seek to consider a similar course. And, with violent crime rising back up, a considerable amount of blight in our older neighborhoods and alleys, and a local economy (Toledo) that today is the poorest of the mid-sized Ohio cities, with our African-American families living at the poorest level of the top 100 metropolitan areas in the country (\$31,100 per fam-



ily of four) – well there is a significant amount of problem solving on the mayor's plate.

As one of the founders of our present form of government, and somewhat of a student of local government, while the mayor ponders his future, I might suggest that the change in government that should be studied by Mayor Wade, and fellow mayors across NW Ohio, is regional governance. Dr. Richard Ruppert explored linking cities and county governments into one regional government. The cities that have done that are prospering – Indianapolis, Louisville and Nashville. I believe such a linkage would bring a much brighter NW Ohio.

Cowell is the son of Suzette Cowell, the CEO of K & L Transportation and a longtime volunteer at the credit union assisting others in achieving their financial aspirations and securing their futures.

Crosby, a former star athlete in high school, college and professionally, has served this community as a youth service manager, a certified mental health and well-being professional, a youth offending mentor and a host of Terry Crosby Youth Basketball Camps. He is a community ambassador for Taylor Automotive Group and involved in many activities throughout the community

Day, a funeral director, has been in the funeral business with House of Day for three and a half decades, and is also a realtor with the Whittington Realty Group. One of her many contributions to the community is the founding of a group "Wake Up Youth" which helps get young women off the street by assisting them with obtaining GEDs, employment and starting businesses.

Hobbs was appointed o City Council in 2020 and won election in 2023. His council leadership roles include Public Safety and Criminal Justice Reform committees. He is a founding pastor of Dominion Fellowship Church and is a member of the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council.

The African American Legacy Project's Community Engagement Meeting

The African American Legacy Project, led by executive director Robert Smith, held a community engagement session July 17 at 1326 Collingwood Ave. The meeting was a follow-up to the organization's recent trip to Columbus, Ohio's historic King Lincoln District. The AALP is preparing to lead the effort to create a historic district along what was once the Toledo's Black Wall Street – The Dorr Street Corridor.

About 20 people attended the follow up meeting arranged by the AALP to get feedback and community input regarding the creation of the historic district. Historically, Dorr Street was the hub of Black life in Toledo, featuring over 400 black owned businesses as well as residential homes before being destroyed by the urban "removal" policies of the 1970s.

The Legacy Project is in its 20th year of preserving the history of Black Toledo. Previously the organization has established the African American Sports Hall of Fame, commemorating the accomplishments of Black athletes in the area as well as establishing an ongoing Legacy Banquet inducting Black community leaders and luminaries into its esteemed Legends Hall of Fame.

The organization has also shed light on the he Black baseball presence here in Toledo, of which Toledo had three Negro League Teams, with an historic marker in 2021, among the organization's many other projects preserving our history.

Forty- eight people traveled on the bus trip to Columbus on July 10. They met speakers, key stakeholders and leaders in the King Lincoln District and engaged in tours of the district including the theatre. The King Lincoln district has been revitalized over the past three decades, becoming a thriving center of Black life for a new generation.

In Columbus, as in much of the country, former Black business districts across the USA became mere skeletons of their former selves. In Toledo, many of the businesses and homes, but not all, were completely razed because of urban renewal. Through education, documentation and planning, the Legacy Project seeks to preserve its past and rebuild for the future.

The community discussion last week was facilitated by Tessa Scott, program manager of Multicultural Programming at the University of Toledo. Guests included government representatives, community leaders, urban planners, neighborhood members, Black media and other stakeholders.

Attendees shared their experience visiting Columbus, the highlights as well as the wisdom received and how to apply the successes of Columbus to Toledo.

"We have to be diligent; it's not going to be easy," stated Ray Woods, former president of the Toledo Branch NAACP. "We have to stay focused, we have to try to incorporate the entire community... The African American community has to step up and join in this together. We can't depend on or expect someone else to see what our vision is, to see what our focus is, we have to make sure that we are steadfast and its' not going to happen overnight."

Members shared the need to unify as a Black community to get the project completed and that the vison is long term.

Those present were asked questions regarding next steps in the process, including what possible stakeholders should be a part of the initiative. Guests were asked to share their ideas on sticky notes that were then read aloud to the group.

Ideas of possible stakeholders included but were not limited to the city, state and county governments, developers, banks, local businesses, local universities, churches, Toledo Public Schools and residents.

"The vision is to take the Columbus model and use history to help change the trajectory of our community... in addition we want to be able to stimulate economic growth development, "stated Smith.

The Legacy Project will continue to engage the community further regarding the future historic district in Toledo's Dorr St. Corridor.

Can you imagine what would have happened to a Black man who showed up at a Donald Trump rally acting "suspiciously" around the metal detectors?

It is no secret to any conscious American why the 20-year-old shooter of former President Trump was not stopped although police and security deemed him to be acting "suspiciously" around the metal detectors at the entrance of the July 13 Trump event in Butler, Pennsylvania.

Rep. Rogers Announces Passage of Final State Capital Budget, Securing Transformative Community Investments in Lucas, Ottawa, and Wood County

State Rep. Elgin Rogers (D-Toledo) last week announced the passage of House Bill (HB) 2, the state's biennial state capital budget, in both the Ohio House of Representatives & Senate. The record-setting \$6.2B investment makes appropriations for state-owned infrastructure, colleges, universities, and school districts as well as other community projects.

In addition to the \$3.51B in traditional capital funds and a \$1.98B appropriation for ongoing projects, HB 2 includes an additional \$700M in state funds that will be directly invested into transformative community projects designed to generate further development & economic opportunity across the state. These state funds were able to be set aside due to the influx of federal relief dollars that helped to supplement the state's balance sheet during the most recent state operating budget.

Rep. Rogers helped secure \$20.5M for House District 44.

"This budget represents a historic investment in our communities, addressing critical infrastructure needs and driving economic growth. I am proud to secure funding that will significantly enhance public services and quality of life in Toledo," said Rep. Rogers

The \$8.15M of those funds will be distributed to several local entities, including

\$4.25M Lucas County Seawall and River Edge Reconstruction Project \$2M Toledo YMCA Domestic Shelter Project

\$1.6M Ottawa Park Revitalization Phase I

\$600M to provide funding for K-12 school classroom facility projects overseen by OFCC.

\$575M for the Public Works Commission to issue grants and loans to local governments for road and bridge projects, fresh water treatment and distribu-

tion systems, wastewater collection and treatment facilities, storm sewer systems, and solid waste disposal facilities.

trigger was because he was White. Period. Once again, it was the lone White male syndrome.

There is no question that had Crooks been a Black man, he would have been commanded to show identification. Had he not concurred, he would have been wrestled to the ground and likely shot dead or choked to death like D'Vontaye Mitchell, who was killed by hotel security June 30 right there in Milwaukee, Wisconsin where the Republican National Convention is being held this week.

Unlike Trayvon Martin, 17, out for Skittles and ice tea in Florida; Tamir Rice, 12, with a toy gun in Ohio; or Airforce Senior Airman Roger Fortson, 23, in his own apartment in Georgia, among dozens of other household names, Crooks was somehow given the benefit of the doubt, allowed to slide on by

It ultimately ended with Crooks shooting and wounding former President Donald Trump in an assassination attempt, killing firefighter husband and father Cory Compechello and critically injuring two other people before he was killed by a police sniper.

As authorities now intensely investigate, the debacle has been described as an "epic failure" of security, mainly the Secret Service. But we all know what it really was. The failure of security was catastrophic because Crooks was White.

As President Joe Biden quickly took authority, met with Homeland Security, the FBI and Secret Service and promised the nation a thorough investigation.

But, Americans have witnessed this all too familiar scenario many times before. When thousands of predominately White Confederate flag-waving Trump supporters headed for Washington, D.C. on January 6, 2021, none of the federal law enforcement agencies responded with the appropriate level of force, resulting in the violent January 6 attack and insurrection.

Clearly, had those rioters been Black, the Capitol Police and other security agencies would have been prepared in advance with military force, dogs and high-powered rifles. They were unprepared for the destruction that occurred that day for the same reason that they were unprepared for the attack on former president, Donald Trump's life in Butler, Pennsylvania. They have yet to become fully sensitized to the danger of the loan White male syndrome. The spirits of racism and White supremacy in America have trained authorities that the Black man should be treated as a threat and the White man should be given a pass.

Fortunately, the would-be Trump assassin did not succeed although a family man took the bullet and died. Donald Trump, shot across the top of his right ear, escaped serious injury and was given a hero's welcome at the Republican National Convention this week. In an iconic photo seen around the world, he pumped his fist seconds after the shooting, shouting to the crowd,

Deep down inside, there's a part of you that always wants to do right.

Did someone teach you that? Or were you just modeling what your elders did when they did what was true and right? Either way, your moral compass points the way,

always. You do right for the world, even if, as in the new novel 54 Miles by Leonard Pitts, Jr., it's the wrong personal decision for you.

Sitting in church, hundreds of miles from home, Adam Simon felt the distance keenly.

This surprised him. It wasn't like he was close to his parents. No, his father, a white minister, had over-preached to Adam for too long, and his Black mother never showed Adam much warmth. With no siblings to help soften these facts, Adam left college to head to Alabama, to work with SNCC's voter registry efforts.

That was the plan, anyhow, but down-deep, Adam had no idea what he was doing. It was a good cause, a great and righteous one, but not without danger: he was almost killed while marching across the Edmund Pettis Bridge.

And that's how his frantic parents learned where he was: alerted by Adam's parents, his Uncle Luther tracked Adam down in a Selma hospital, took the young man in, and notified Adam's parents that he was safe.

By that time, George Simon was on his way to Alabama for his son's sake.


Years ago, George and his now-wife, Thelma, had busted almost every racial law the South imposed, and they married. Shortly afterward, George's father sent the new family north, for safety. And now Adam was in Alabama, in the mouth of the dragon.

But Adam had other troubles on his mind.

He knew he shouldn't have snooped, but while staying with his Uncle Luther, he found a stash of old letters, and he read them. What he learned shocked him, and he had to leave Luther's home immediately.

The problem was, Adam had nowhere to go.

Were you there? If not, can you imagine what it was like to live in 1965,



at the height of the Civil Rights Movement? Readers who don't know or can't picture it will get an eyeful of what was possible inside 54 Miles.

In setting his novel roughly in the years 1945 to 1965, author Leonard Pitts, Jr. doesn't make reading this book easy. There are passages inside this novel that will make you want to wince and turn away and – caution! – they're not for the weak-stomached. Just remember, they're essential to the story and to why the characters act as they do.

On that, you'll enjoy most of these characters as they look to the past and future, working their ways through personal struggles and one of the more tumultuous periods in American history. Details help, making this books' cast feel more authentic.

 \cdot He called football players protesting wrongful police killings of Black men and women "sons of bitches."

· During the Charlottesville "Unite the Right" rally that drew White supremacists from across the country in 2017, Trump said there were "very fine people on both sides."

• And most recently, during the CNN debate against President Biden, he referred to "Black jobs", apparently espousing a stereotype that he has yet to explain.

Thankfully, Donald Trump survived the assassination attempt. But the fact is that the so far unrepentant former president was nearly killed by the same evil that he has helped to perpetuate.
