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Too Close for Comfort

A vote is a kind of prayer about the kind of world we want to live in.

With less than two weeks remaining in the 2024 election season, you can almost cut the tension in the air with a knife, and it's not just a national phenomenon. Once comfortably predictable, local races have become tight, dramatic and, in many cases, impossible to forecast, making many local politicians extremely uncomfortable.

Whether due to economic anxiety, voter fatigue, or decision paralysis resulting from the constant bombarding of political ads, social media posts, and campaign outreach, shifting political winds are converging in a way that makes this election feel different. Nothing is guaranteed as the votes roll in, and even the safest races could be upended.

The Marcy Kaptur Dilemma: End of an Era?

One of the most striking examples of uncertainty is Ohio's 9th District congressional race between long-serving Democrat Marcy Kaptur and her Republican challenger, Derek Merrin. Kaptur has been a fixture in Ohio politics for over four decades, but now, for the first time in 40 years, her seat is truly up for grabs. Although Kaptur has a narrow lead in recent polling, 16 percent of voters remain undecided. This race is so significant that the outcome could determine control of the U.S. House of Representatives. Yet the contest is so tight that it's impossible to predict a clear winner even at the 11th hour

Yet, even as voters head to the polls, they grapple with rising costs despite national economic experts debating the reality of inflation's impact. This economic anxiety plays directly into Merrin's message for change, making the once-safe Kaptur seat a toss-up. Kaptur's decades of service and connections to bountiful federal resources and demonstrated ability to bring them back to her district could prove beneficial. However, nothing is guaranteed in an environment where many voters crave something new.

Tax-Levy Hesitation

While Lucas County's congressional race is one headline, the local tax levies may be the most precarious aspect of this election. The rule of thumb has always been that levies never lose in election years in Lucas County, and no one remembers the last time it happened. However, the current economic climate, marked by a perceived rise in inflation, is fueling uncertainty and hesitation among voters, and levies that usually sail through could be facing their toughest battles yet.

With local media constantly highlighting the pinch of rising prices, voters are more aware of their financial constraints, even if the statistics show inflation to be within normal bounds.

In addition, with the repetition of negative ads drilling the misleading message that inflation is through the roof and killing single families, some levy requests for new money could fail. The other challenge for tax measure proponents is getting their story out in an environment where there's so much noise just about the presidential, senatorial and congressional elections, es-

Toledo Schools Superintendent Named Urban Educator of the Year

Romules Durant, superintendent/CEO of Ohio's Toledo Public Schools, received recognition as the 2024 Urban Educator of the Year at the Council of the Great City Schools' 68th Annual Fall Conference.

Five big-city school superintendents competed for the nation's highest honor in urban education leadership, recognizing, in alternating years, an outstanding superintendent and school board member from one of the 78 largest urban public-school systems in the country.

Urban school leaders applauded Durant during the Council's 35th Annual Green-Garner Award Banquet, where he received the prestigious leadership award. Sponsored by the Council and Scholastic, the global children's publishing, education, and media company, the top prize is presented each year in memory of Richard R. Green, the first African American chancellor of the New York City school system, and businessman Edward Garner, who served on the Denver school board.

A graduate of the Toledo school system, Durant has served as superintendent for 11 years, making him the longest serving superintendent in the Council. Under his leadership, the district has had five successful levy campaigns, graduation rates have increased and gifted services for elementary students and Advanced Placement courses for high school students have expanded. In addition, the district has opened five magnet high schools, including the new Toledo PreMedical Science and Health Science Academy, a school that focuses on preparing students for careers in the medical field.

"Romules Durant has been a transformational leader and a tireless advocate for students in Toledo Public Schools to become college and career ready graduates," said Council Executive Director Ray Hart. "His passion for excellence in his 11 years of steady leadership has shown all of us in urban education what is possible. Our sincere congratulations to Romules and Toledo!"

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As the recipient of the 2024 Green-Garner Award, Durant receives a \$10,000 college scholarship to present to a student in Toledo Public Schools.

In addition, a second major award was given out by the Council to Mona Al-Hayani, a veteran history teacher

at Toledo Early College and a graduate of Rogers High School. Al-Hayani received the 2024 Queen Smith Award at a breakfast last week in Dallas, accepting on behalf of all TPS teachers and urban educators across the country. The Council and McGraw-Hill Education present this award each year in the name of the late Queen Smith, whose life represented honor, excellence, and commitment to urban public education.

This is the first time the Council of Great City Schools named both the Superintendent of the Year and Teacher of the Year from the same district.

Last week, at the American Association of School Personnel Administrators national conference in Seattle, Toledo Public Schools received the AASPA's William L. Hunter Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Award.

Diversifying the Saddle: The Importance of Representation in Equestrian Culture

When you think of cowboys, what comes to mind? Wide-open spaces, lassos flying, and perhaps a certain type of person riding a horse. But have you ever considered the faces behind the saddles? **Alan Durden, CEO** and founder of **Just Doing God's Work**, is a Black cowboy changing the landscape of the equestrian world, and his story is one of resilience, innovation, and a deep commitment to giving back.

A Unique Perspective

Durden's journey began in a loving family that emphasized community values. "My LLC is called Just Doing God's Work," he shares, underscoring the belief that his work is a form of service. Raised in a church environment with parents Mr. & Mrs. Roye and Yolanda Durden, Alan learned early on that helping others was important. "Being an entrepreneur and training horses while interacting with the community came from my strong upbringing," he explains.

Growing up, Durden was surrounded by examples of generosity. "My dad is a therapist, and my mom has a communications degree. Through their example, I've always seen the importance of giving back." Can you think of someone in your life who inspires you to help others?

From a young age, Durden's entrepreneurial spirit was clear. "I technically started my first business at nine years old," he recalls, showing that even as a child, he was thinking about ways to make a positive impact. "From a very young age, I wondered how I could make billions of dollars—enough to change the trajectory for future generations, not just for my family." This ambition sets Durden apart in an industry where diverse representation is scarce.

Black History in the horse industry

Throughout history, the contributions of Black individuals in the equestrian world have often been overlooked. From Fort Malden, a British stronghold during the War of 1812, to the Underground Railroad that helped approximately 100,000 enslaved people find freedom, the journey of Black Americans is rich with stories of resilience and courage.

In the late 1800s, as cattle ranching expanded across the West, thousands of freed Black individuals found new opportunities as ranch hands, with historians estimating that one in four cowboys of the past were Black. These trailblazers helped shape the cowboy culture we recognize today, paving the way for future generations.

Education & Training

Alan Durden stands as a modern embodiment of this legacy. He pursued his passion for horses at the University of Findlay, where he studied Equestrian Studies with an emphasis on Western Riding and Training. His dedication paid off when he became a two-time national champion, representing the university at the IHSA Nationals in Kentucky. Graduating as the top individual in his equine program, Alan's accomplishments reflect not only his talent but also the rich tradition of Black cowboys who came before him.

With years of training under his belt, Durden worked as an assistant trainer from 2017 to 2022, honing his skills under multiple professionals across the East Coast. Now, as the head trainer and event coordinator at OH Stables in Oregon, he continues to elevate the horse industry.



The Road to Innovation

Many people dream of inventions, but Alan took action. When he realized that the horse business could be profitable, he combined his passion for horses with his business acumen. "The horse industry is where God blessed me



with my greatest talents," he says. With his patent for a revolutionary horse toy, he is poised to make a mark in an industry that has traditionally lacked diversity.

Durden's journey wasn't easy. "When I did research on what it costs to get a utility patent, I found out it was roughly \$15,000. I didn't have that kind of money at 22," he explains. Determined, he took a job with Norfolk Southern laying railroads. "I worked there for just over a year, saved the money, and bought my patent."

As of 2023, Alan Durden is a U.S. registered patent holder for a revolutionary horse toy, set to hit the market in 2025. Through his journey, Durden honors the legacy of Black cowboys, ensuring that their contributions are recognized while inspiring the next generation to embrace their own equestrian dreams.

Teaching and Healing Through Horses

Durden is not just an entrepreneur; he is also an educator. He teaches lessons to people of all ages, from young children to those in retirement. "I teach lesson programs where I am blessed to reach and touch the lives of many," he shares. Imagine the joy of being the first person to give someone their first ride on a horse!

Working with horses also offers therapeutic benefits. Durden shares, "Working with horses is both healing and therapeutic." Did you know that many people find horseback riding helps with issues like anxiety and depression? The vibrations from a horse's heartbeat can even promote healing. Durden notes, "The human heartbeat vibrates less than a foot away, but a horse's heartbeat vibrates approximately 7 to 8 feet in distance." This connection to horses can create a sense of peace and healing for many.

A Journey of Representation

Representation matters. In the United States, Black riders make up only about 0.5 percent of the members of the United States Equestrian Federation. This statistic highlights a significant gap in representation. Imagine if the world of horses was more diverse—how would that change the stories being told?

Durden is working to change this narrative. His goal is not just to succeed personally but to uplift others in the process. "Doing God's work is really what

I live by," he states. By sharing his knowledge and experience, he is paving the way for future generations of black equestrians.

His sister, Alaina Durden, is also making strides in her field. A medical student at Yale and celebrated graduate of the University of Toledo, she has received multiple awards for her dedication. Alan beams with pride when he talks about her accomplishments, saying, "My sister is the only person from my childhood who followed through with the things she said she wanted to do. I am so proud of her. She's an amazing role model and big sister."

It's clear that this family values hard work and education, setting a blazing trail for others to follow.

The Impact of Mentorship

Durden's influence also extends to actively working with the disabled community, demonstrating that horses offer more than just recreation; they serve as powerful tools for healing and empowerment. "Being able to reach people through horses is amazing. Every experience is a journey," he expresses, showing the joy he finds in helping others.

As you think about your own experiences, who has been a mentor for you? Durden's work reminds us of the importance of mentorship and representation in every field, especially one as historic and impactful as equestrian culture.

Looking to the Future

Alan Durden is not just a Black cowboy; he is a trailblazer. With his horse toy set to hit the market soon, his journey is just beginning. He is transforming the equestrian industry, proving that one person can leave a lasting impact on many.

As Durden continues to break barriers and inspire others, his story serves as a powerful reminder of the importance of representation in all fields. How can we each contribute to making our communities more inclusive? Whether it's

"It's so vitally important that we have these international relationships and that our children are globally competent," she continued,





ruising Around The World in 274 Days

A Travelogue - Part One!!!

In the song, 'Happy Feelin's,' Frankie Beverly and Maze, sing "Happy Feelin's in the air Touching people everywhere. . . And these Happy Feelin's I'll spread them all over the world."

In the last couple of weeks, when asked about my recent cruise, I have used "fabulous," "extraordinary," "awesome" or "phenomenal" to describe this life-altering, epic world cruise. But, those terms are inadequate. 'Happy Feelin's' captures my excitement and joy about the world cruise and my desire to spread those feelings all over the world.

My journey to the world cruise began over 30 years ago when I was sitting in Heather Downs Country Club attending a Zonta International Meeting and a Toledo Blade reporter spoke to the club about her recent world cruise. I was hooked before she finished talking. I knew immediately that I wanted to go on a world cruise. I just did not know "how" and "when" I would be able to travel around the world. I told all my friends about my desire to see the Terracotta Warriors and Machu Picchu. Remember, exposure to possibilities is a key motivator!

Then, in October 2021, the Royal Caribbean Cruise Line announced the 2023-2024 Ultimate World Cruise. It was the longest world cruise ever scheduled. The COVID-19 Pandemic and the uncertainty of the future made my decision easy; I booked the cruise that week.

The cruise started in Miami on December 10, 2023, and ended on September 10, 2024 in Miami. It consisted of seven Continents, 65 Countries, 156 ports of call/cities and 11 World Wonders.

The cruise was for nine months or 274 days with overnight stays in 30 ports/ cities. The cruise was divided into a nine-month cruise, four Segments (60+ Days each) as well as 17 individual mini-cruises. Cruisers could select the nine-month cruise, any of the four Segments or one or more of the individual mini cruises.

There were 2200 cruisers and 859 hand-selected crew members on the ship. Seven hundred of the cruisers were on the cruise for the entire nine months. Twenty-five of the nine-month cruisers were African, Caribbean, and/or African

America people who formed a group on the ship called, The Neighborhood.

The oldest cruiser was 89 years old and the youngest cruiser was 2 years old. The majority of the cruisers were 65 years old or older RCCL's Serenade Of The Seas in and retired. Sixty school-age children were ship-schooled and 78 cruisers worked remotely from the ship via Starlink. And, from time to time, we had as many as 15 TikTokers

Both the cruisers and crew were from all over the globe. Cruisers were from the USA, South America, Australia, Singapore, Japan, and Italy to name a few home countries. The majority of the ship's crew were from Ja- slavery, I think maica, India, Indonesia, Philippines, Brazil, of slavery in South Africa, United Kingdom, Zimbabwe the USA. Howand China. Only a small number of the crew ever, stories of members were from the USA.

Thailand – A Country Full of Wonders

Everyone who visits Thailand starts in Bangkok, the nation's capital city which is located in the southern part of the country. From Bangkok, visitors can easily reach nearby cities such as Ayutthaya, Pattaya, Rayong, Hua Hin and the far southern reach areas such as Phuket.

Chiang Mai ("new city" in Thai) was founded in the late 13th century and sits in a valley on a river basin in the Thai highlands. Over the years, more than 300 Buddhist temples have been erected in the metropolitan area, including the famous 600-year-old Wat Chedi Luang ("The temple of the Big Stupa") at the historic center of the city, the Wat Phra Singh Temple, ornately decorated with gold, and the Tapae Gate, part of the ancient city walls that were restored in the 20th century.

Other impressive sites in and around the city include the Wat Pha Lat, a temple hidden in the forest near waterfalls, and the not-so-secret Secret Elephant Sanctuary. Don't overlook the extensive Chiang Mai night bazaar, a night market featuring vendors and the delicious street foot that is an ever-present feature of Thailand.

Temples, mountains, tea gardens, street food, beaches are all part of the wonders of Thailand – more beach resorts than any other country, in fact. In the north, as in much of the country, such wonders are endless. Chiang Mai is the gateway

to a variety of scenic and historic areas, particularly due north of the city.

Chiang Rai (city of the "Rai" named for a 13th century founder) is 175 kilometers north of Chiang Mai and is renowned for a number of fabulous sites including two artist-created villages – the Wat Rong Khun ("white temple") and Baan Daam ("black house"). Both creations sit on acres of land housing numerous museums, temples and displays.

Chiang Rai also hosts the "blue temple" of Wat Rong Suea Ten and the Clock Tower which lights up at night in a spectacular fashion.

Again, while visiting all of these sites, please don't forget to eat – whether in some of the many restaurants, in the various markets or even at the numerous street food shops.

Head a little farther north after a day or two in Chiang Rai to Mae Sai – on the northern border with Myanmar. Mae Sai is also in a valley and a trip up the surrounding mountains will take you to villages inhabited by the Hmong people and tea gardens and coffee plantations. When the border with Myanmar is open, you can go through the market and visit the neighboring village.

If you rented a car to drive around up north to Mae Sai (bus day trips are available everywhere), when you enter Myanmar, remember to move back over to the right-hand side of the road. After driving in Thailand for a while, you have probably become adjusted to the British-influenced left hand side driving. Time to reconnect with your American training ... for a while.

Remember the incident in 2018 when 13 young footballers and their coach were trapped in a cave by flooding water and divers converged from around the world to rescue them? That cave is in Mae Sai and has become something of a destination for local and international visitors. You can go into the cave itself and see why the youngsters were so curious to venture farther in.

Then take a side trip to Chiang Saen (named after a 14th century founder) and see the Golden Triangle – the junction of Thailand, Myanmar and Laos, separated by the Mekong River.

There's a lot to see in this northern area, among the cities of Chiang Mai, Chiang Rai, Mae Sai and Chiang Saen. A full week – even two – in this region would not be out of the question. If you have another week or two at your disposal on this or perhaps another trip, take a visit to the area northwest of Chiang Mai – the Mae Hong Son province. More on that later.

pecially with so many levies being simultaneously on the ballot.

The recent rise in property values provides an even more challenging variable, complicating new levies and adding financial pressure on voters already overwhelmed by economic uncertainty.

However, if you are looking for a couple of "must-support" options, a yes vote for Issue 29, Senior Citizen Services, and Issue 30, Children Services tax measures are at the top of my list.

Candidates in Traditional Democratic Strongholds: Safe, But Not Without Drama

Despite the overall political anxiety, many Lucas County Democratic candidates still seem to be in strong positions. Candidates like Pete Gerken, Anita Lopez, Katie Moline and Elgin Rogers are expected to secure re-election easily. These incumbents have maintained a grip on their local strongholds by remaining insulated from the broader dissatisfaction sweeping through national and state races.

That said, the contest between Republican incumbent Josh Williams and Democratic challenger David Blythe is a serious campaign. It perhaps is the local race to watch, especially in terms of the state legislature.

While Williams, the incumbent, is slightly favored to win, Blythe's strong campaign efforts and the district's redrawn lines could prove that no race is a foregone conclusion and possibly flip the seat to the Democratic Party column.

Notably, in the 2020 election, Lucas County was 76th out of Ohio's 88 counties in terms of turnout and below Cleveland, Columbus and Cincinnati. We have not been able to generate a blue wave in terms of voter interest recently. So, in this environment, turnout will be crucial, and the unpredictability of voter engagement still makes even the safest-seeming races feel vulnerable to last-minute shifts.

Mayor Wade Kapszukiewicz and the Term Limit Referendum in the Spotlight

The Mayoral Term Limits Charter Amendment has generated significant discussion among the key local ballot issues. With a yes vote, this measure would increase the number of consecutive four-year mayoral terms from two to three. A no-vote majority would potentially end Mayor Wade Kapszukiewicz's future political career in the city's top office. The measure is polling too close for comfort, with a razor-slim majority favoring the term limit expansion.

While many voters are satisfied with Wade's performance, there's still a growing sentiment that fresh leadership is needed. In a year where change is

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a prevailing theme, the referendum's outcome is uncertain but could reshape local politics for years.

Issue One: The Redistricting Puzzle

Adding to the political guesswork is Issue One, the Citizens Redistricting Commission initiative. This measure, designed to end partisan gerrymandering in Ohio, has created a fog of confusion among voters. Both supporters and opponents claim their vote will end gerrymandering, leaving many unsure of which side to support.

Nevertheless, the stakes are high, as the outcome could drastically reshape Ohio's political landscape by aligning district representation more closely with the state's actual voter distribution. Yet, with the odds of passage at 50/50 and a lack of clear messaging on either side, the fate of Issue One remains one of the most unpredictable elements of this election cycle.

Considering all of this, it becomes clear that this is a pivotal moment in this election season, if not history. Lucas County voters are headed to the polls in anxiety amidst deep uncertainty.

From Marcy Kaptur's possible end to the wave of local tax levies on the chopping block, which candidates will survive? What tax levies or referendums will make the cut?

With only a handful of days left to November 5, what remains clear is that every race, levy, and issue is precariously tight and too close for comfort; every decision hangs in the balance, waiting to be shaped by the voters' final say.
