A Call for Collective Self-Examination

As the dust settles on local elections, where political outcomes were largely as anticipated in Lucas County, a more profound reflection demands attention from Democrats nationwide.

While stalwart figures like Marcy Kaptur hold their ground in close races and local Democratic Party politicos like Pete Gerken and Anita Lopez demonstrated their electoral reliability, the broader election results exposed the cracks in the Dem's strategy that helped give the keys to drive democracy over the cliff to a candidate who openly expressed misogyny, racism, Stone Age patriarchy, and authoritarianism.

These cracks spotlight the Party's urgent need for a collective self-examination, particularly regarding how it conveys its messaging in the 21st-century's informational warfare for the mind.

Whereas the Party's traditional political methods — door-to-door canvassing, ground-game strategies and reliance on name recognition still hold value, they flounder to counteract the Republicans' tidal wave of misinformation, emotionally charged rhetoric and digital disinformation campaigns that dominate modern electoral politics.

Metaphorically speaking, the Democrats entered the 2024 elections armed with brass.

Volunteers deployed from the Dems' extensive network of field offices in key swing states went out and passionately rang doorbells, armed primarily with clipboards and passion. They engaged in logic-based conversations, attempting to persuade undecided voters or energize the base sincerely.

In blunt contrast, the Republicans wielded iron – where social media platforms became a battleground for voters' minds, and echo chambers

became their campaign offices. Instead, they used carefully calibrated algorithms to ensure that once Republicans engaged voters, they stayed engaged. The Republicans then fed their voters a steady diet of tailored messages to align with and confirm their pre-existing beliefs or biases, thus solidifying their allegiance.

By weaponizing tools like Facebook and Elon Musk's Twitter (X), the Republicans exploited their base's existing discontent to magnify perceived injustices and drive engagement using AI to elicit strong emotional reactions, provoking outrage or anxiety.

True, the Republicans used misinformation and disinformation as their primary weapon.

For example, they painted the economy as collapsing despite recordsetting steady economic growth, exaggerated crime rates to stoke fear, falsely blamed inflation and renewable energy for high costs rather than massive corporate price gouging, and amplified baseless claims about election fraud and cultural threats.

These AI-driven narratives tailored to voter biases not only reinforced their supporters' fears and deepened social and political divides but were also far more effective while requiring fewer resources than traditional Democratic outreach.

While the Democrats succeeded in maintaining high turnout among most (not all) of their loyal base in urban and suburban strongholds, they struggled to win over swing voters and other demographics like Hispanic voters and men in key battleground states. Their reliance on traditional canvassing methods couldn't compete with the Republicans' targeted messaging, which infiltrated voters' daily lives and dramatically shifted voters' perceptions.

Indeed, the outcome was as if two armies were fighting, one armed with tradition - ornate but inefficient and outmoded bronze swords that required constant care and resources despite having outlived their usefulness, the other with durable iron blades that were sharper, stronger, and more widely available.

As it stands, the 2024 election serves as a testament to Benard Ighner's classic song "Everything Must Change," which he wrote and performed on Quincy Jones' best-selling 1974 album, Body Heat. Just as iron usurped bronze and reshaped the ancient world, AI has begun to reshape our social and political landscape. Those who possessed iron in the transition from the Brass to the Iron Age ascended to power and dominated just as those who can master AI - for good or ill - today will dominate the future.

But as history shows, progress is rarely reversed. Once the superiority of iron over brass became transparent, societies that failed to adapt found



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
Toledo Opera to Hold OPERAtunity Day & Triviata Night



TARTA Announces Plans for Next Year

On Thursday, November 13, the Toledo Area Regional Transit Authority hosted a community update at the Glass City Center and announced its vision and plans for 2025 to the several hundred people in attendance.

Three new initiatives were announced by Laura Koprowski, TARTA CEO and president. A new payment system, TARTA card, is coming soon. This smart card will enable

long-term passengers to ride at more affordable rates. "The more you ride, the more you save," said Koprowski. Fares on the prepaid card are capped at \$3 per day, \$15 per week, and \$45 per month, regardless of how many trips are taken in those time periods.

TARTA will also update its paratransit system buses and rename the system. TARPS will become TARTAmore in order to avoid confusion and reflect that fact that all TARTA riders are treated equally. "Paratransit service is just as important as our other services," said Koprowski.

The third initiative, and perhaps the most significant of all, is the TARTA plan to start a feasibility study in February to look at introducing Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) to Toledo along six possible routes. BRT is a high-capacity system that provides more efficient service then tradition bus systems in a combination of

light rail and bus service.

BRT typically has a lane dedicated to bus traffic, more frequent service, various bus entries to ease boarding, elevated platforms at defined stations, offboard fare collection, and traffic signals designed to give buses the right of way.

Six cities in the US have already introduced BRT, including Cleveland and a team from TARTA, along with local officials have visited Cleveland to view that operation.

The feasibility study will be financed through a \$400,000 grant from the Federal Transit Administration along with \$100,000 contribute from TARTA.

Koprowski suggested that Monroe Street, from Sylvania to downtown, could be one of the six routes.

The guest speaker of the community update was Anna Letitia Zivarts, author of a book titled When Driving is Not an Option. Zivarts, an advocate for equitable transportation, is visually limited and unable to drive. Her book notes that there is such a significant number of people who cannot drive – as many as 30 percent - for a number of reasons and are therefore unable to access the societal benefits available to those who can drive and have the vehicles to do so.

TARTA also presented results of its ridership surveys, which show that satisfaction with Toledo's transit service is at an all-time high and above national averages.


"We had 300 register, and we had over 100 people show up the

This has been the biggest event yet with plans to return and continue to grow next year in 2025!



In Memoriam – Patricia Ann Hogue – March 9, 1954 – November 2, 2024

With deep love and admiration, we celebrate the life of Dr. Patricia Ann (Hendley) Hogue, who transitioned peacefully on November 2, 2024, at the age of 70, from a chronic cognitive condition. Born in Norristown, Pennsylvania, Patricia was raised by her beloved parents Robert & Frances Mary Hendley along the scenic Schuylkill River, where she enjoyed an idyllic childhood. As a young girl, Patricia's bright spirit shone



through as a cheerleader at A.D. Eisenhower Senior High School, where she graduated in 1972, embarking on a lifelong journey of caring for others.

Patricia's dreams led her to Montgomery County Community College in Pennsylvania, where she began her studies to become a registered nurse. However, her passion for medicine and desire to make an even greater impact led her to Hahnemann Medical College, now part of Drexel University College of Medicine, where she earned her Bachelor of Science in Physician Assistant (PA) Studies in 1987. It was here that her calling as a PA flourished. Driven to expand her expertise, Patricia would go on to earn her Master of Science degree in 2000 from Rosalind Franklin University of Medicine and Science in North Chicago, Illinois.

In 1996, Patricia became a pioneering figure in medical education, co-creating the first accredited PA program in Ohio at the University of Toledo (UT). For over three decades, Patricia made her mark as a Clinical Coordinator, Associate Professor, Academic Department Chair, and Associate Dean at UT. Her dedication led her to obtain her PhD in Public Health/Health Education at UT in 2007, where she also served as the Associate Dean of Diversity and Inclusion, ensuring that all students—especially those from underrepresented, international, and first-generation backgrounds-felt welcomed, supported, and empowered to succeed.

Dr. Hogue was more than an academician; she was a mentor, advocate, and second mother to many. Known for her unwavering commitment, Patricia often invited students into her home, guided them through challenging times, and offered the compassionate support that many PA students today credit as the foundation of their success. Her legacy lives on in the hundreds of PA professionals she trained, many of whom now serve communities across the globe.

In addition to her remarkable career, Patricia was deeply involved in service organizations and cherished her friendships in The Toledo Chapter of The Links, Incorporated (inducted in 1991), and the Zeta Alpha Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha (AKA) Sorority, Inc. (pledged in 1995). She and her beloved 21 other AKA line sisters pledged under the Candy Reign line name.



She was also a cofounder of BDIG (Bankers Dozen Investment Group), an investment group that fostered lasting friendships, and a devoted golfer with the Tee Town Swingers, a women's golfing group. Her church family at Friendship Baptist Church was central to her life, where she and her husband Ron Hogue shared their faith, kindness, and opened their home to countless friends and family members.

Patricia and Ron's love was evident in their shared passions for travel, church, golf, and creating a warm, art-filled home where all felt a sense of belonging.

Patricia will always be known for her beautiful humor and warm personality. Always in a jovial mood, she made others feel so positive by her undeniable effervescent energy.

Preceding her in death is Robert Hendley Sr. (Father); Frances Mary Hendley (Mother); Anthony "Smack" Hend-




Do You Have the Balls? details all aspects of Terry Crosby's journey from his childhood, famed sports career, relationships, mentorship, community work and more.

Tom Cole, the renowned Toledo sportscaster, held an 'An Evening with Tom Cole' a question-and-answer session and book signing October 17 at the Lourdes University Franciscan Center. Cole discussed his new and fourth book Black in the Pocket: African American Quarterbacks That Changed the Face of American Football.

His latest work is dedicated to all the African American Quarterbacks who persevered and struggled in the 1960's, 1970's and 1980's to create a level and fairer playing field that exists today in pro football for Black quarterbacks. (Source: www.authorhouse.com) In his book, Cole details the discrimination many Black athletes faced to break barriers in American football. Cole gives his detailed insight into the careers of local to national players including Chuck Ealey, Doug Williams and more.

"The history of quarterbacks in pro football is that if you were an African American, and you were a quarterback, the first thing the coach said to you most times when you got to the NFL was "You're a really great athlete BUT. There was always a but.... You're a really great athlete BUT-- you're going

School and the University of Tennessee, was drafted to the NBA with the Kansas City Kings in 1979 and later led a 17-year professional basketball career overseas in England where he holds a Guiness World Record. Now he serves as Community Ambassador for Taylor Automative.

"My life is so much more complex than just the sports side," he shared. "All throughout my book I mention the word God, because He is the one who has placed me on this Earth to basically follow His instructions. Everything you see me do – it's not me– it's God's work. So I give all praise and all glory to Him."

While Crosby has experienced astounding success on the court and in life, he said one of his biggest accomplishments is becoming an author.

"Writing a book is one of the toughest challenges I've ever faced in my life," he reflected. On August 21, 2024 he published his first book. "I've never felt the feeling that it gave once I became an official published author. It's hard to explain. It's a feeling of euphoria to the highest limit."

"I really wanted to open up to the world and give them an opportunity to get to know the real me because I'm a very private person... even though I'm out in the community everyday that's part of my job... people make assumptions about me and they have to because they don't really know me as the man that I am," Crosby added.

"Most people don't know me... there are a lot of things that I want people to know that they don't know," he continued.

The takeaways he hopes people of all ages and walks of life will receive: "The part about perseverance, believing in yourself more than anyone else because if you don't believe in you how are other people going to believe in you."

"Also, emphasizing that I have had a lot of lifetime achievements in my life, but those achievements weren't given to me. I had to work for those, and it's not always been cake and ice cream for me throughout my life," he shared.

Crosby hopes to shed a deeper light on one of Toledo's legends as well as inspire the future generation of leadership with a book that he believes will impact many people even after he is gone, "the book will be here much longer than I will," he shared.



to be a wide receiver, defensive back or a running back. Not even giving them the opportunity to show what they could do," he stated.

The reality is that for a large stretch of sports history Blacks couldn't become quarterback. That continued in the 50s, 60s, 70s and 80s. Doug Williams was noted to be the first African American to start in and win a Superbowl in 1988 breaking the ceiling for many. Cole shares this story, "From that point – no one could ever say that an African American quarterback could not lead a team and win a Superbowl. That stopped it. That took a long time. Now today it's where it should be."

While Cole highlights the triumphs and success stories of Black athletes, he also uses his book and his platform to underscore those Black athletes who were overlooked and never received their just due.

"We all stand on other people's shoulders. How many people do you know that did great things, but they didn't really get recognized for it... but people stood on their shoulders. To me, this was kind of an homage to all these gentlemen that fought this fight and maybe didn't get recognized. This is my little way of recognizing them," he shared.

A signed copy of the book and refreshments were included in the event as well as a mix-and-mingle opportunity to meet the author.




At some point in the next few weeks, somebody's going to bring up That Story.

You know the one: That Story happened 15 or 20 years ago, when you were a kid and did something dumb that became a hilarious tale for an elder to pull out every holiday. Har-dee-har-har. As in the new

memoir, *Growing Up Urkel* by Jaleel White, being an adult doesn't give you a pass.

It was only meant to be a single appearance.

Twelve-year-old Jaleel White was a veteran of television, having already appeared in a handful of TV shows and commercials, so he knew what he needed to do to land a bit role on a popular ABC sitcom. He dressed the part, showed



up for the audition and was cast in a one-time role of a neighbor of the Winslows on *Family Matters*.

That episode was so well-received that White became a permanent member of the cast.

As an only child, White says he was raised with a sort of humbleness: his parents encouraged him to reach for his dreams, but they never told him that he was "famous." Like all Hollywood stars, he had an agent, a contract and a salary but when he wanted money, his mother never gave him more than \$300 at a time. Wealth, to White's

parents, was never the goal. College was, and they made sure that funding his education was part of the deal.

Years later, by the time the show was canceled, White was ready to move on. He'd gone from a five-foot-tall adolescent into an athletic young man. He'd taken the character as far as he figured he could, while learning to stand up for himself and how to write for TV.

"My life started the day that Family Matters ended," he says.

Even so, he writes, years would go by before he was able to merge the man he wished to be with the nerd most people remembered him as.

If you were ever a fan of '90s sitcoms, you might not know it but you've been waiting for a book like this. Author Jaleel White is a big boy now and in *Growing Up Urkel*, he shares with readers what it's like to become an adult in front of millions.

But that's just part of That Story.

White also gives readers repeated peeks behind many different Hollywood curtains to reveal the warts of stardom: agents who take advantage of naivete, people who talk big but never deliver, actors who turn nasty behind the camera, and an entire you-scratch-my-back-I-scratch-yours industry that's only survivable with fortitude and perseverance. This book isn't just about broken dreams, though. White remembers former cast members and other actors with affection, and he shares anecdotes that will make you nostalgic.

As told by a boy-turned-man, a former kid in the limelight looking back, *Growing Up Urkel* is an interesting take on Tinseltown and it may spur you to set up a binge-watch date soon. For anyone who loves a good memoir, you'll like That Story.

Royster is a survivor of teen homelessness herself and offers a unique prospective to serve her clients. "I was homeless at the age of 14 for six months. My second mom is from New Jersey, and she had someone transport me from here to New Jersey to save me from the streets," she stated.

Her professional experience also led her to expand beyond the traditional for the affected youth population. "I've been in case work for 22 years," stated Royster, "and I just have problem that kids are in the system for 18 years and then they get kicked out. No support and no basic life skills... so within a month people are surprised that they're locked up selling their bodies on the corner,' she stated.


Beyond the immediate relief OATL provides through essential resources like food, clothing, hygiene products and housing assistance, Royster stated that OATL educates their clients on what healthy relationships should look like, fostering long-term change.

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

Open Arms Transformation Living Hosts Gala

TaTiana Cash, WTOL 11 News Anchor, served as mistress of ceremonies. The evening featured keynote speaker Cecelia Williamson, Ph.D., executive director of the Human Trafficking and Social Justice Institute at the University of Toledo.

Open Arms Transformation Living is a nonprofit dedicated to empowering marginalized female youth aged 12 to 20 who face the challenges of homelessness, exploitation, and running away.

The mission began as a response to the growing issues of youth homelessness, teen dating violence, and human trafficking. (source: oatltoledo.square.site)

Open Arms Transformation Living was established in March 2022 as a 507 (c)3 nonprofit addressing youth homelessness in Toledo, where approximately 2,000 local teens are homeless.

Some statistics on affected youth:

- 50 percent of foster care children face immediate homelessness upon aging out of the system.

- Additionally, within 48 hours of being released from foster care, a staggering 75% of homeless young adults resort to engaging in various forms of survival sex, such as street prostitution, working in strip clubs, or participating in pornographic activities online. (The National Center for Homeless Education (NCHE))

- The average age of entry into prostitution is typically between 13 and 14

"It's also to raise funds to get brick and mortar because the majority of the clientele we serve are human trafficking survivors, teen dating violence survivors and children that struggle with poverty."
