The Great Campus Capitulation

There is no such thing as a neutral education. Education either functions as an instrument to bring about conformity or freedom.

Sit. Stay. Fetch. Roll over.

Like a well-trained pet dog, the University of Toledo has made it clear: it knows how to obey. Hiring James Holloway as its 19th president is just the latest command it has followed without question, signaling the completion of its ideological transformation.

The metaphor isn't accidental. Holloway, a seasoned administrator from the University of New Mexico and former vice provost at the University of Michigan, arrives not simply as a university president but as a symbol of a new University of Toledo order: a public institution once committed to uplifting its community that has now become a university eager to heel and please at the sound of political pressure and roll over without even a growl.

Student leaders, especially from the Black Student Union and other multicultural groups, have been outspoken about their loss of advocacy and safety. One insider put it bluntly:

"Mr. Holloway is gonna face pushback over his recent handling of the pro-Palestinian encampment and unionization efforts at his former institution, and that's who they (UT trustees) want. They want to take us backward into a buttoned-up university that doesn't seem to value free speech or workers and grad students. —I mean, they made their choice."

And that choice, the source continues, isn't just administrative—it's ideological:

"This is a Trump pick, trying to stay in line with the policies of the current administration. If you want federal money and do all that s**t, you're gonna have to dance to the autocratic, misogynist tunes of Trump's whim."

Whew!

For certain, the choice to hire Holloway cannot be isolated from the larger political context. It follows Trump's executive order declaring DEI policies presumptively illegal in federally funded institutions. At the state level, Ohio's Senate Bill 1 bans DEI offices, mandates ideological neutrality and guts entire academic departments deemed too "controversial" or under-enrolled.

UT has responded accordingly.

It eliminated its Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. It fired the DEI vice president. It suspended entire majors in Africana Studies, Philosophy, Religious Studies, Women's and Gender Studies, Disability Studies and oth-



ers. More than mere administrative updates-these moves are likely "ideological purges dressed in the language of efficiency."

UT rationalized the cuts as an issue of low enrollment, but this is more likely a fig leaf. Notably, the programs cut are the very ones that interrogate power, center marginalized communities, and challenge dominant narratives. "I highly doubt the eliminations are coincidental—they are strategic capitulation," the insider said.

The Cost of Silence

UT's Board touts Holloway's success in boosting enrollment and research at the University of New Mexico. And yes, research matters. But let's be clear: this is not about DEI alone. At the core, it's about the soul of the university. Public education is a democratic pillar – a place where ordinary people can gain knowledge concerning truth-telling, justice and freedom.

As an alum, like many others across the globe, including a large number of Black and Brown Toledoans, it is truly disheartening to see the institution shift from academic freedom to ideological supervision, transition from community engagement to centralized control, and pivot away from equity in access to uniformity in outcomes. However, UT's not-so-subtle strategic structural evolution is now complete with Holloway's hiring. And, in doing so, it has abandoned its highest calling – to be a space where truth is pursued, not suppressed.

On paper, James Holloway is the ideal candidate: an R1 scholar, enrollment booster and research champion. But these credentials are only half the story.

In reality, the University of Toledo no longer leads. Instead, in an era demanding moral clarity, it has chosen to sit, to stay, to obey, to roll over, and surrender. Not just administratively but spiritually, morally, and intellectually.

The only question that remains is whether students, faculty, alumni, and community members will accept this transformation as inevitable or demand that our university be more than a compliant pet for its political master.


About One Half of Americans Said ... Go Ahead!

Trump's Anti-Immigrant Cruelty is a National Scourge – And Would Be Made Worse by the MAGA Budget Bill

"Our neighbors are living in fear. And that's what the administration wants. They want people to be scared. So, we're combatting that by bringing the neighborhood together and saying, 'you're not going to frighten us into complicity; you're not going to frighten us into hiding; we're one neighborhood, regardless of anyone's immigration status, and we're going to stay one neighborhood.""

That is how Gabe Gonzalez, an organizer in Chicago's Rogers Park, described how his neighborhood has responded to Trump's immigration crackdown – both

during his first administration and throughout the first months of his current one.

On Martin Luther King Day this year, I gave the keynote at the Rainbow PUSH Coalition's annual MLK Day breakfast. It was Inauguration Day. The contrast between the hope in that room and the fear outside – especially among Chicago's immigrant communities – was sharp. Reports had already confirmed that Donald Trump's new administration would make Chicago "ground zero" for an intense national sweep by US Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

Raids were imminent.

The mass Day One sweep did not materialize quite as advertised by Trump's border czar Tom Homan. But thousands of people were still swept up across the country that first week of the current Trump adminis-

tration. The fear these actions are still creating is very real. And for good reason.

Since then, the Trump administration's deportation campaign has spread. What started in Chicago has become a national scourge. Families are being separated from Denver to Worcester. Parents arrested in front of their children. Kids coming home from school to find their homes ransacked and caregivers gone.

When armed agents grab someone without a warrant, haul them away from their family, and disappear without explanation – that is not just cruel. It is lawless. That is why community groups like Gabe Gonzalez's have set up rapid response teams, legal observers, and know-your-rights trainings. In some cases, their efforts have stopped ICE in its tracks.

The cruelty of these raids is matched only by their chaos. ICE has arrested green card holders. Detained US citizens. Deported people who know the US as their only real home to countries they barely remember – or had fled for safety. All of this is meant to send a message: no one is safe.

The message is loud. And so is the silence that often follows it.

People are afraid to report wage theft or unsafe working conditions. Parents fear school pickups, or taking their kids to church on Sunday. Victims of domestic violence stay silent, worried that asking for help will get them deported. And even documented immigrants live in fear.

This is not security. It is terror. And it is why so-called "sanctuary cities" like Chicago – and "sanctuary states" like Illinois have put policies in place making it illegal for local law enforcement to participate in immigration crackdowns. Police already face enough trust barriers with many of the communities they work in. That makes their job harder. Being part of Trump's anti-immigrant terror campaign would in some cases make it virtually impossible.

It also could be about to get even more dangerous. The Republican budget bill moving through Congress would supercharge ICE with \$80 billion in new funding. More agents. Fewer guardrails. And a leadership culture that seems more interested in punishment than justice.

And the strategy is broader than immigration. This is a movement that spreads fear, then exploits that fear to divide us – Black from Brown, citizen from immigrant, neighbor from neighbor. But as Gonzales and other organizers in Chicago have shown, solidarity still wins.

This fight is about more than policy. It is about who we are. It is about remembering that every person – no matter where they were born – deserves dignity. Deserves due process. Deserves safety.

The poem engraved on the base of the Statue of Liberty reads, "Give me your tired, your poor, Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free." It makes no mention of any race, religion, or country of origin. It speaks to immigration making our country what it is. Making us stronger. Making us what Frederick Douglass called the most "perfect national illustration of the unity and dignity of the human family that the world has ever seen." That is the American Way.

Ohio's Budget Cuts Raise Concerns Among Area Citizens



June 30 is the deadline for the Ohio Senate to approve the state budget, a budget that for State Senator Paula Hicks Hudson represents a setback for the safety and well-being of the Ohioans.

The "Leading Ladies of the Legislature Town Hall Tour" arrived at Sanger Branch Library on Friday, May 23, as Hicks-Hudson and State Representatives Michele Grim and Erika White led a discussion focused on what the current budget proposal, sponsored by Ohio Republicans, would mean to their constituents if accepted in its current form.

A \$3.9 billion cut to Medicaid, zero property tax relief, cuts to childcare and a \$100 million deduction from Ohio's libraries system are some of the consequences that state residents would face if this budget is approved.

"We want the people who voted for us, who trust us, to be aware of

what's happening. We also want to listen to them and have them propose solutions for the good of Toledo and Ohio," Hicks Hudson said.

One of the attendees, representing the neighborhood coalition opposing the expansion of I-475 in West Toledo, indicated that it would be better if the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) invested the \$217.5 million that the expansion would cost in the state's childcare system. That way there would be at least more than 50 caseworkers available and better child protection mechanisms.

Shareen Strozier, supporter of the Kei'Mani bill proposal, asked Senator Hicks and Representatives Grim and White to support this legislation.

This bill, named for Kei'Mani Latigue, the 13-year-old victim of a homicide earlier this year, seeks to ensure that children in danger and who were kidnapped can find safe homes where they will receive protection and support.

"The community must come together to take care of our children. If we put all our effort into this, we can have a law that protects all children who need safe environments," Strozier said.

The bill's potential cost has yet to be determined, but Senator Hicks Hudson indicated she's working closely with Strozier to make it a reality, because "the number of Black and Brown children reported missing in northwest Ohio is concerning."

Representative Grim stated that her priorities are focused on providing support for victims of domestic and sexual violence, expanding access to public transportation, and reforming medical debt; while Representative White noted that she is focused on raising Ohio's minimum wage and improving access to higher education.

These discussions will be repeated throughout the state as an initiative promoted by the Ohio Democratic Women's Legislative Caucus (ODWLC).

New Writers Work Series Commemorates Malcolm X's Centennial

The New Writers Work Series presented "The Resurrection of Malcolm X" in celebration of Malcolm X's 100th Birthday at Kent Branch Library Wednesday, May 21. The original stage production, written by Detroit author and journalist Eddie B. Allen, Jr., featured Cleveland-based actor Grant (Steward) Walker and local actor Richard Brown III. The performance was free and open to the public.

The unique stage play featured a one-man performance by Walker with supporting acting by Brown. The production highlighted historic multimedia images of the life of Malcolm X.

"We have a great admiration for Malcolm X and in the spirit of the celebrations that were taking place and are still taking place across the country– it just made sense," stated Allen. [We're hoping] that folks that weren't as familiar would learn from a dramatization of his life. We didn't want [Toledo] to be left out."

Born Malcolm Little in Omaha, Nebraska on May 19, 1925, Malcolm X's magnification into a world-renowned advocate for racial and social justice included a stint in prison that led to an introduction to the Nation of Islam. From the late-1940's to his assassination in 1965, his life was "a chronology of changes," as his autobiography describes it, which ultimately impacted his fearless stance against white supremacy, and later influenced multiple generations of activists and artists.

The play is a revision of the original work which was first written in the late 1990s and re-staged for this historic moment honoring the revered icon.

"Malcolm's dignity and his integrity and his honor – it grows and grows – particularly in this world we that we live in right now. We don't have a lot of people that have honor and integrity. And in portraying him I at least try to feel some of his spirit and it's timeless. He was a very, very kind and very decent man," reflected actor Grant Walker.

"Malcolm is very personal and very much and inspiration," he continued.

Following the performance the audience and the production team engaged in a discussion about the play as well as topics ranging on the life, death and legacy of Malcolm X.



A Ribbon Cutting for the New Wayman Palmer YMCA

Local city, state and federal officials held a ribbon cutting at the new Wayman Palmer YMCA on Monday, May 12, to celebrate the opening of the grand new facility in the heart of Toledo's inner city. The new Y has been open for six weeks and already an additional booming membership shows that the new building is going to be a huge success with area residents.

"The kids in this neighborhood deserve all of the nice things that kids in any neighborhood deserve," said Toledo Mayor Wade Kapszukiewicz during his remarks before the ribbon cutting. The mayor pointed out a number of successes his administration had had during his almost eight years in office but stated that the construction of the new Wayman Palmer Y is the accomplishment he is most proud of.

"This is the best YMCA that can be built," Kapszukiewicz added. Swimming pools, a splash pad, expanded meeting rooms and workout rooms, Toledo Public Schools Head Start classrooms, a day care center for studentparents, a computer/game room are among the many amenities that will to continue to bring in an expanded membership.

The project began in 2021 with federal funds from the American Rescue Plan Act, as Congresswoman Marcy Kaptur noted. The overall price tag for the new building of about \$31 million began with \$19 million ARP Act monies, supplemented by \$7 million in community development dollars and \$5 million in federal tax credits, said Kaptur.

"The federal government makes a difference," she said.

Rosalyn Clemens, the City of Toledo director of Housing and Community Development, is the person who put the project together and made it work even as the initial financial projections were insufficient to complete the building with all the services and amenities that city leaders desired for the neighborhood.

"This is probably the most impactful [project] I have ever done," said Clemens. Clemens certainly had her work cut out for her. When the project was announced in August 2021, the price tag for the building was estimated at \$21 million. During the construction phase, Clemens was determined to maintain the vision of the complete package of amenities and services in the original concept rather than cutting into that vision to stay within the \$21 million budget. Her task therefore was to find additional funding.



She not only found that money but also has managed to put together an additional \$1 million in annual funding to upgrade all of the city's parks.

"We will continue to do the work [to fund] our underserved neighborhoods," she said.

Also speaking at the ribbon cutting ceremony were State Senator Paula Hicks-Hudson and Councilwomen Vanice Williams and Cerssandra McPherson, all of whom have personal connections now or in the past to the Wayman Palmer Y.

"This is a full circle moment for me," said Williams, who lived for many years in nearby Moody Manor.

The new YMCA is on track to meet its future financial goals. According to Clemens, the new facility needs 2200 memberships to break even financially. That would be a tremendous increase in the number of memberships the former building generated. According to YMCA officials, the old building averaged 500 memberships annually. In just six weeks after opening, the new Y already has 1600 memberships.



Rep. White Celebrates Bipartisan Bill Honoring Black, All-Female WWII Unit Being Voted Out of Committee

HB 204 designates March 9th as 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion Day

State Reps. Erika White (D-Springfield Township) and Melanie Miller (R-Ashland) Wednesday were excited to announce that House Bill (HB) 204 was unanimously voted out of the House Veterans and Military Development Committee. The bill honors the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion, commonly known as the "Six Triple Eight," the only Black, all-female unit serving in Europe during World War II.

"As these courageous women overcame obstacles and shattered stereotypes, they not only fulfilled their military duties but also illuminated the vital contributions of Black women in the armed forces, paving the way for future generations of all to follow in their footsteps. We honor their undeniable contributions, indelible impact, and remarkable bravery-a legacy, an undeniable testament to the truth that acknowledges that diversity in all roads inclusively leads to Ohio!" said Rep. White.

On February 3, 1945, the U.S. Army boldly deployed a unit of over 800 Black women to England with their mission initially unknown. Today, we know their mission and their motto. This trailblazing unit was entrusted with the mission and monumental task of sorting and delivering mail over two years of backlogged mail to American troops stationed overseas, a mission that

significantly boosted morale during a critical time. As the unit shared, "No Mail, Low Morale".

This mission was lead under the exceptional leadership of Ohioan Lt. Colonel Charity Adams, the highest-ranking Black female officer in World War II, this battalion-also comprising of dedicated women recruited and trained in Ohio-played a pivotal role in this historic mission.

The Battle for the Black Mind by Karida L. Brown

If you had a dime for every time a teacher, parent, or supervisor told you that, you'd be rich. Stop fooling around. Consider what you're about to do. Act with resolve, not impulse. It's the best way to work, the optimal

method for learning and, as in the new book *The Battle for the Black Mind* by Karida L. Brown, it's what so many have fought for.

In the months after the Civil War ended, it became apparent to both Black and white people in both North and South that education for four million suddenly-freed former slaves was "a matter of national security." It was obvious that those citizens would require formal learning soon, maybe job training – but what kind and how much?

While Mary Smith Peake had "laid the foundation" for Hampton University already by then, two white men with vastly different intentions traveled south after the war to seize control of Black education. Edmund Asa Ware, who became the first president of Atlanta University (now Clark Atlanta University) built schools that "aimed at nurturing Black intellectualism and potential," while General Samuel Chapman Armstrong, who was the first president of Hampton Normal and Agricultural Institute (now Hampton University) had plans to "civilize" formerly enslaved people through physical labor and farm work.


Booker T. Washington was one of Armstrong's best-known protegees.

In 1881, Washington became the first president of Tuskegee Institute and was later instrumental in forming the "Tuskegee Machine" which, says Brown, didn't altogether help "Black families and shoved a singular curriculum down their throats." There were 45 Black colleges and universities in America then, though education for most Black children was still lacking.

It remained so in the Jim Crow era when, although literacy rates grew, education beyond a few years of elementary school was "rare" for Black Americans. By then, says Brown, Black women had stepped up to do the work, becoming teachers, bookkeepers, experts in strategy, fundraisers, staffers. Managers and marketers – sometimes, all at once...

Blending personal observations and experiences with good backgrounding, author Karida L. Brown tells this story in a conversational tone that invites readers to peek down the halls of history's HBCUs and into classrooms. She writes to readers, rather than at them, which helps to open minds for what's inside *The Battle for the Black Mind*.

You may not need to be reminded about racism in Black American education, but the secrets she shares and the lines she draws are highlighted to seem like new information. Here, readers can see more clearly the connections between the early twentieth-century and now, and how Project 2025 could change the trajectory. Fortunately, Brown also offers advice and ideas for taking action and ensuring that upcoming generations can win the next "battle."



The Battle for the Black Mind is a lively book that you can read for information, history, or just because. But beware: it might make you want to get up, contact your Representative or Congressperson, and *act*. It's the kind of book that'll make you think.

Either way, if a named beneficiary decides not to attend school, the account owner can change the beneficiary to another eligible family member.

Contributions are easy: 529 plans accept contributions from anyone, regardless of whether they are account holders, making it easy for loved ones–from grand-parents to family friends–to contribute to tax-advantaged education savings.

Savings are falling short: Only 38 percent of Americans feel like they are saving enough to reach their education savings goals, meaning most families will likely need to lean on student loans to meet costs. A 529 plan can offset what your family might need to borrow, helping position you for a debt-free future.

Financial advisors can help: The majority of respondents (78 percent) do not typically consult a financial advisor before making decisions related to education savings, but 21 percent say that working with a financial advisor would help them feel better about covering the costs of future education expenses. Financial advisors can act as impartial third-party experts to develop tailored strategies to meet your savings goals within the context of your big-picture financial goals.

He started out as an All City team member and then All MAC and All American by the time he departed The University of Toledo. He then went on to win the Super Bowl in Miami. He's one of the greatest Athletic leaders.

> • Mel Long - Macomber HS, member of University of Toledo 35 & 0 campaign and then the Cleveland Browns. Long joined the military service before going to college. He walked on the team then was immediately awarded a scholarship. He was a true leader of the team and spent a lot of time guiding his brothers to multiple victories.

> He was an All American on five different All American teams and was the first one in the history of the University of Toledo. During his Marine Corps service in Vietnam, he was awarded the Navy Cross, which is the most prestigious award that a Marine can win.
